WATER INTERRUPTIONS ... FIRE HYDRANT INSTALLATION

Council would like to thank residents for their continued patience during the installation of the new fire hydrants in the town. To date, two new hydrants have been installed. One at the corner of Pearl's Lane/Reidville Road and a second at the corner of Elms Street/Reidville Road.

The next hydrant installation is scheduled for **July 27 & 28.** Unless there is a scheduling conflict with our backhoe operator, the hydrant will be installed over these two dates. If there is a scheduling conflict, the hydrant will be installed on **August 3rd & August 4th**. The hydrant is schedule to be installed at the intersection of Rocky Brook Road and Reidville Road.

NOTE: Due to the location of this hydrant, water services will be interrupted for residents from Rocky Brook and East. Also at this time, the town's boil order will also include the residents from Rocky Brook and East.

Please mark these dates on your calendar. It is virtually impossible to contact each resident individually - **PLEASE MARK YOUR CALENDAR** so you will be aware why you will be without water for a number of hours on either of these two dates. Council will try and limit your inconvenience as much as possible. Your continued patience is appreciated.

NOTE: While new hydrants are being installed council would appreciate it if residents stayed back from the construction site. Any site under construction is considered a safety hazzard. Your patience and understanding here would be greatly appreciated.

ANIMAL COMPLAINTS

Dogs: The number of complaints that council has had regarding dog(s) barking

in the Elms Street/Reidville Road area and dogs roaming in the Forest Road/Reidville Road and Rocky Brook Road area are phenomenal. It is due to these concerns that council will be increasing animal control in our town. Please note that if your pet is tied on all the time in your back yard, people are sleeping with windows open and are kept awake by your pet. Please be considerate of your neighbors and keep your pet quiet at night.

Horses: This item appears frequently in the newsletter. Any rider on a horse is asked to be very conscious of horse droppings on the town's roadways. If you are traveling on the many hay fields in our town, this is not such a concern - however while riding on any streets in our town, council would appreciate it if you cleaned up behind your animal. These beautiful creatures are a pleasure to look at and Reidville is the home of many - however their droppings can be both a nuisance and a safety hazzard as walkers are forced to walk around it as they travel the town's roadways.

Please help keep our town clean, green and happy.

NOISE CONCERNS

Some residents have been disturbed by construction/development taking place within the town's boundary at six and seven am.
