### FIRE PREVENTION WEEK – OCTOBER 9-15, 2016

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Don't Wait – Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years," represents the final year of our three-year effort to educate the public about basic but essential elements of smoke alarm safety.

Why focus on smoke alarms three years in a row? Because NFPA's survey data shows that the public has many misconceptions about smoke alarms, which may put them at increased risk in the event of a home fire. For example, only a small percentage of people know how old their smoke alarms are, or how often they need to be replaced.

As a result of those and related findings, we're addressing smoke alarm replacement this year with a focus on these key messages:

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.
- Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your home.
- To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date.

If you are in need of a new smoke alarm or fire extinguisher, please call any member of the fire department.

# TAX COLLECTION

As of September 12<sup>th</sup> the town's collection rate for 2016 stands at 96.60%. Compared with the same time last year, the town's collection rate is up from 95.04%.

NOTE: All seniors (65 years of age or older - or turning 65 any time during 2016) are eligible for an additional 5% discount. Please advise the office if you will reach the age of 65 during the 2016 year so that your taxes can be adjusted to reflect the discount on your 2016 tax bill.

#### CHASE THE ACE FUNDRAISER

Join The Reidville Volunteer Fire Department at Chase the Ace Lottery every Sunday night at the Community Center

The money raised from the Lottery will be used to help purchase Fire Protection Equipment.

Tickets will be sold weekly at the Community Hall from 7:00 pm to 8:15 PM with a ticket draw at 8:30 PM. Tickets are \$2 each, 3 for \$5 or 7 for \$10 and can only be purchased at the event on Sunday nights. The Consolation Prize will be given away each Sunday. The Jackpot is now almost \$3000. The Jackpot will grow each week until the Ace of Spades is drawn.

Ticket sales are to persons 19 years of age or older.

#### DOMESTIC CUTTING BLOCK

The town has applied for a domestic cutting block to enable residents to cut firewood. This has been incorporated with the forestry's five year plan and has been approved but permits will not be available to purchase until January 1, 2017.
