PERMITS

With building season upon us please note the cost of all Permits:

Commercial (per building)	\$200
New House:	\$100
House Extension:	\$50
Accessory Buildings:	\$25
General Repairs:	\$10

There is No Charge for a General Repairs permit for seniors. Most of these items will have to go to council for approvalplease pick up your application or print it off the town website and submit it for the second Monday of every month.

HEALTH TIP

During waves of heat, your health may deteriorate rapidly. Certain precautions must be taken to make yourself more comfortable and reduce health risks for you and your loved ones.

- Keep well hydrated
- Drink 6 to 8 glasses of water a day. If necessary, follow your doctor's instructions for the amount of liquid to drink
- Avoid alcoholic beverages as alcohol can exacerbate dehydration
- Refresh yourself often:
- Bathe, shower or take a cool bath daily
- Refresh your skin with a wet towel several times a day
- Spend at least 2 hours a day in cool and air-conditioned places (libraries, shopping centers, etc.)

- Protect yourself from heat:
- Limit physical effort
- Wear light clothing
- See how your loved ones are doing, especially those with reduced autonomy or that live alone
- Watch for heat notices and heat alerts, and follow the recommendations of Environment Canada or your region's public health authority.

Walkers/hikers may still enjoy the trail:

-from the Mill Beach (Boat launch area) to Trout Brook Bridge and the Trout Brook Loop and return along the same.

-from Jones Trail entrance to Trout Brook bridge or to the mouth of Trout Brook on the North side.

-from the Tramway Parking Lot to the Humber River and return.

WALKING TRAIL DAMAGES

The town has been notified they will receive some emergency funding to do some necessary repairs on the trail. This work will probably not start for a couple of weeks so the list below is still in effect until that time.

Walking Trail Damage:

Walking Trail Committee members checked out the damage done to the Trail as a result of the January Ice Dam and flooding. It will be necessary to barricade the trail from Trout Brook Bridge to the Tramway Site until repairs are possible.

SORT IT WESTERN

A 2-Stream Waste Management Program for Western Newfoundland will begin in our area on October 15, 2018. Residents will receive an information package by mail with tips on how to sort their waste and will receive free bag samples in the package. There will be public education campaigns from Western Regional Waste Management on Facebook and in newspaper and on Radio. The town is also considering having an information session at the community center a couple weeks before this is launched.
